- The first Edinburgh Festival Fringe took place in Edinburgh in 1947.
- The Edinburgh Festival Fringe runs for 25 days in August every year.
- In 2015 over 50,000 performances took place at the festival.
- Over 2 million tickets were issued for the festival in 2015.
- 313 venues or theatres took part in the festival.
- The dates for the 2016 Edinburgh Festival Fringe are 05–29 August 2015.
- There are eleven genres or types of performances in the Edinburgh Festival Fringe:
 - 1. Cabaret Variety
 - 2. Children's Shows
 - **3.** Comedy
 - 4. Dance, Physical Theatre and Circus
 - 5. Events
 - **6.** Exhibitions
 - 7. Music
 - 8. Musicals and Opera

 - 11. Street Performance
